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# WELCOME



his October, Oscar Wilde would have celebrated his 168th birthday. Celebrated poet, W.B. Yeats once said of Oscar Wilde "The dinner table was Wilde's event and made him the greatest talker of his time, and his plays and dialogues have what merit they possess from being now an imitation, now a record, of his talk." For those who are not familiar with Oscar Wilde, he is considered one of the greatest playwrights of the late nineteenth century. However, it was Oscar's passion for self-publicity and witticisms that kept (and keeps) him in the consciousness of the public. Upon investigation, not only are Wilde's

witticisms hilarious, but deeply truthful and resonate over a century-and-a-half since his triumphant era of popularity. Here are a handful that caught my attention:

"Always forgive your enemies; nothing annoys them so much."

"Everything in moderation, including moderation."

"Be yourself; everyone else is already taken."

"To love oneself is the beginning of a lifelong romance."

"Only dull people are brilliant at breakfast."

Perhaps it was his birth name, Oscar Fingal O'Flahertie Wills Wilde that gave him a passion for the flamboyant? Hard to know where his razor-sharp focused wit came from, but it's comforting to know that his words are alive and living well on our stage with the hilarious play *The Importance of Being Earnest*. This is Theatre Calgary's fourth production of the play. We first produced it in 1970, again in 1978, and once again in 1995. I hope you enjoy this scrumptious production of Oscar Wilde's most popular play, and the second-most produced show in our history (the first being *A Christmas Carol*)!

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# **DIRECTOR'S NOTES**



hen The Importance of Being Earnest premiered in London in 1895, Oscar Wilde was quoted in the St. James's Gazette, explaining that the play was "exquisitely trivial, a delicate bubble of fancy" and that philosophy of the play is "that we should treat all the trivial things of life seriously, and all the serious things of life with a sincere and studied triviality." This was the way Wilde lived—a constant contrast of sincerity and triviality. Shortly after the premiere of his play, his life took a tragic turn. He was on trial for "gross indecency" within weeks and sentenced to two years imprisonment with hard labour only months later. He

had been leading a double life, just like Jack and Algernon, but luckily he was able to give his characters a happier ending.

So what is it about *The Importance of Being Earnest* that still makes us laugh out loud well over a century later? Well, as Lady Bracknell says, "we live, I regret to say, in an age of surfaces." This feels as true now as it was in Oscar Wilde's time. In fact, despite the fact that his satire targets the upper classes of Victorian England, the jokes still ring true. It's just as delightful now (if not more so) to laugh out loud at the pure absurdity of these characters' artifice and superficiality. In fact, as I was diving back into the world of this play (that has been one of my personal favourites for years), I kept thinking of shows like *Bridgerton*—set long ago and far away but written with the sensibilities of here and now. To me, Oscar Wilde was so ahead of his time in writing this script that I imagine we could come across these characters on screen today, although certainly not with his unique wit. As Gwendolen tells us, "in matters of grave importance, style, not sincerity, is the vital thing," and very few authors live up to Wilde's style.



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

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# **OSCAR WILDE**




scar Wilde (1854 – 1900) was born in Dublin to Sir William Wilde and his wife Jane. While studying at Oxford, he was fascinated by the aesthetic movement and eventually became a proponent for L'art pour l'art ('Art for Art's Sake'), and wrote the award-winning poem *Ravenna*. After he graduated in 1879, he moved to Chelsea in London to establish a literary career. Upon graduating in 1879, he moved to London to review art, write poetry and lecture in the UK, the United States, and Canada. In 1884, Mr. Wilde married Constance Lloyd and, in the course of their turbulent marriage, had two sons.

His first and only novel, *The Picture of Dorian Gray*, was published in 1891 and has been adapted for the stage. Mr. Wilde's first successful theatrical endeavor, *Lady Windermere's Fan*, opened in 1892. He went on to create the wonderfully popular comedies *A Woman of No Importance* (1893), *An Ideal Husband* (1895), and the classic *The Importance of Being Earnest* (1895).

Not long afterward, Mr. Wilde was publicly accused of homosexuality and arrested for gross indecency. During his time in prison he wrote *De Profundis*, a dramatic monologue and autobiography, which was

addressed to his lover Bosie. Three years after his release in 1897, he died of cerebral meningitis in a rundown Paris hotel. Known for his philosophical wit and irreverent charm, Mr. Wilde is famously quoted as saying 'Life is too important to be taken seriously.'

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
